**1** he three state park campgrounds in the Columbia River Gorge-Ainsworth, Memaloose, and Viento-offer seasonal camping amidst a national scenic treasure.

#### Ainsworth State Park (open mid-March-October)

- 43 full-hookup sites with sewer, electricity, and water (24 pull-through)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Six walk-in tent sites and a designated bike-in camp area
- One campsite (B31) accessible to campers with disabilities
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- RV dump station (please use the station to dump a full holding tank instead of a campsite connection, which can overflow)
- Connection to the Gorge Trail 400

### Viento State Park (open mid-April-October)

- 56 electrical sites with water
- 18 tent sites with water nearby
- One campsite (A26) accessible to campers with disabilities
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- Day-use area with river access for swimming and windsurfing

#### Memaloose State Park (open mid-March-October)

(Note: The campground is accessible only from I-84 West. If you are headed east, take exit 76 and go back three miles westbound on the freeway. Drive through the rest area to the campground entrance.)

- 44 full-hookup sites (sewer, electricity, water)
- 66 tent sites with water nearby
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Flush toilets and hot showers (solar-heated)
- RV dump station

Please be advised that there is no safe or legal river access at Memaloose.

# **Discovery Season**

From October 1 - April 30, you can rent a full, electric, or tent site for less. At Ainsworth, Memaloose and Viento, you can get \$4 off summer rates during the times these parks are open.

# **Adventures in the Area**

In addition to Ainsworth, Memaloose, and Viento, there are many other state parks in the Gorge. Their day-use areas are gateways to sightseeing, hiking, windsurfing, and more. You can enjoy waterfalls, trails, and views of the gorge from several state parks along the Historic Columbia River Highway, including Guy W. Talbot State Park, which features a short trail to the 249-foot Latourell Falls. Spectacular 620-foot Multnomah Falls is just four miles west of Ainsworth State Park.

#### **Day-Use Area Fees**


Day-use parking permits are required year-round at Rooster Rock, Benson, Dabney, East Mayer, Viento, and the Twin Tunnels trailheads on the Historic Columbia River Highway State Trail. You will need to display a daily, 12-month, or 24-month permit or your camping receipt, which serves as a daily permit for each of the days you are registered. Daily permits are sold at the parks; annual permits are available at most major state park offices.



**Park Information:** 

Historic Columbia River Highway State Trail

Hikers and bikers can get breathtaking views of the Columbia River Gorge from the Historic Columbia River Highway State Trail. The Mosier Twin Tunnels stretch is a paved five-mile route between two trailheads. A visitor station lies on the west end. The section from Cascade Locks to Tanner Creek (near the Bonneville Dam) offers five miles of mostly flat hiking and biking. An additional two miles between Moffit Creek and John B. Yeon State Park are expected to open in September. All segments of the trail are rated moderate to difficult for people with disabilities. The Starvation Creek trail in Viento State Park is one mile long and connects with U.S. Forest Service trails for more challenging hikes. All pets must be on leashes with a maximum length of 6 feet.
