TRANSPARENT DISPLAYS

F or most visitors, it is hard to imagine that there once was a bustling industrial operation in what is now the center of Pine Grove Furnace State Park. To illustrate the history of ironmaking here, the Friends partnered with State Park staff to create two new history displays.

Park maintenance staff built and installed the wooden frames for two "see through" displays. One is at the east end of Fuller Lake past the beach, while the other is near the furnace stack in the historic core of the park.

One "see-through" transparent wayside at the furnace shows the stone stack at the center of various buildings and machinery around 1883.

A second "see-through" display at the east end of Fuller Lake shows the "old ore hole" when it was a quarry in the 1870s. Many thanks to our chair, Andre Weltman, for his legwork on making this creative project happen.

KOPPENHAVER TRAIL BRIDGE

In late May, volunteers and park staff worked together to replace the small trail bridge midway along Koppenhaver Trail. Volunteers tore down the old 30-foot "pole bridge" and replaced it using \$550 in lumber and hardware donated by the Friends of Pine Grove Furnace State Park and two utility poles donated by First Energy.

Many thanks to all of our volunteers for their hard work in building a bridge that will be used by thousands of people every year! It is located not far from the large metal bridge across Mountain Creek we installed in 2020.

FLOWER BASKETS

Each year the Friends donate baskets of geraniums to hang on the porch of the State Park Office/Visitor's Center. In an effort to improve habitat for native birds and insects, for 2022 we instead purchased native plants. Park staff planted the hanging baskets with wild geranium, foamflower, creeping phlox, wild ageratum, coral bells, hay scented fern, and New York fern. The plants will be transplanted along park trails at the end of the summer.

BOY SCOUT PROJECT

An old log building, known by many as the original snack bar for Fuller Lake Beach or as a former lifeguard shack, received a major facelift this spring during an Eagle Scout project led by Carson Fahnestock. The small structure on Fuller Field near the lake had deteriorated due to poor rain drainage and was urgently in need of repair.

Carson, a member of Troop 190 in Grantham, worked with the park to come up with a budget, donations, supplies, and volunteers. His plan included adding a rain gutter, replacing badly rotten logs along the bottom front of the cabin, repairing the chinking, and staining the entire exterior. Sixteen volunteers, including eight Boy Scouts, assisted in the project.

The Friends of Pine Grove Furnace State Park contributed \$500 toward the overall cost of \$4,352. Other donors

included the American Legion Mechanicsburg, the American Legion Enola, the American Legion Mt. Holly, Home Depot, the Lower Allen VFW, the Kiwanis Club, the Mechanicsburg Club, the Knights of Columbus, and Carson's family.

According to Carson, it was a personal challenge to guide and keep on top of the entire project. He also noted that the rainy weather added additional complications, and it was not easy to move the three 500-pound utility poles that replaced the rotting logs.

The improved building is a convenient storage area for park staff and volunteers, but it will not be renovated into a concession stand as in the past.
