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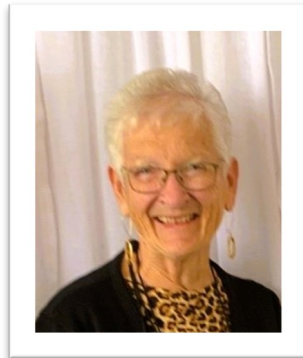

complete listing of entries (Receipts and Warrants) are given at the end of every month to the State Officers. All reports are balanced with the reconciled bank statement cash balance every month.

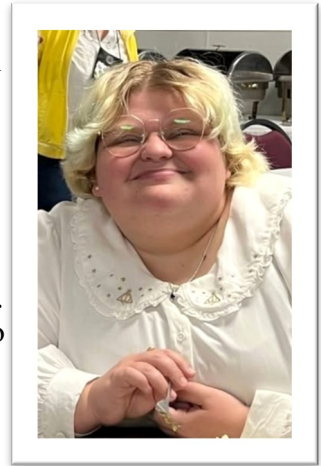

State Library Board

Nothing Novel about NoveList

Per its web site, the State Library of Kansas “maintains digital databases for state agencies and research and historical databases for the general public. Digital collections also include eBooks, audiobooks, and online resources for Kansans.” These are great resources for all Kansans and well beyond what any individual or library could afford.

A visit to the site at <https://library.ks.gov/home> shows a tab marked Kansans and a link labelled as Databases. A simple click on it reveals a list of seventy-seven resources that are available to all through the subscription power of the library. They cover everything from A to Z or at least W, as it begins with the tool Academic Search Premier and winds up with WorldCat First Search. Midway through the list is a resource of particular interest to readers known as NoveList Plus. It offers a wealth of information on books and authors and is a respected tool that helps guide readers to their next great read.

In addition to helping identify and locate titles by certain authors or on specific topics, NoveList also assists readers with the more subjective aspects of books, aka The Feels of reading. In addition to exploring genres, it also includes sections like “I’m in the mood for books that are....” where users can dig a little deeper and match titles to their current state of mind. This includes looking for titles that are fast paced and funny, have moving or sympathetic characters, are suspenseful and unputdownable, etc. It covers all ages, from adults to teens to early readers.

One area of narrowing the field that is near and dear to many readers hearts is finding titles that are similar in some respects to those they have read and enjoyed, aka the read-alikes. That is, fans who just can’t get enough of a particular author but are all caught up on what he or she has written so far, can tide themselves over until the next release with other works that bear a resemblance to their fave.

For example, the legions of Freida McFadden fans waiting for their turn at her latest title can find a list of authors identified as read-alikes for her work. Nine are currently on that list and range from Rachel Howzell Hall to Mary Kubica to Joy Fielding to Alafair Burke. In the meantime, Clive Cussler devotees could discover the like of Peter Benchley, Douglas Preston, Matthew Reilly and James Rollins. In addition to keeping the pages turning, this voyage of discovery can also introduce readers to authors they’ve never tried before and possibly a whole new list of titles for their must-read notebooks.

NoveList also offers a multitude of lists and categorizations that readers often use to help them make their reading choices. This includes a monthly reading challenge, lists of must reads and titles/authors that are currently trending. For the latter that includes sections on Best Bets for Book Clubs, Cozy Reads, Romantasy, Senior Sleuths, and more.

In the world of web resources and databases, books and their readers continue to hold an important place in the realm. Their priority is evidenced by the inclusion of NoveList in the statewide subscriptions and the recognition of its importance by the State Library of Kansas.

May 24th. 2025. Crosses (380) were placed on the Veteran's Plot, Oak Hill Cemetery Lawrence, Kansas by the GFWC Classics, Lawrence. White crosses were made by two Classic's Boosters, Rick Moore and Bob Schwartz. Crosses were adorned in four work sessions by members, with a red and blue flower and bow. Veterans Committee Chairperson, Margaret Barnes introduced this project years ago when 25 crosses were made and placed, then in year two 135 were made and placed; culminating to a total of 380 crosses this year. Nearly every veteran's grave was decorated with a cross in the Veteran Cemetery Plot.

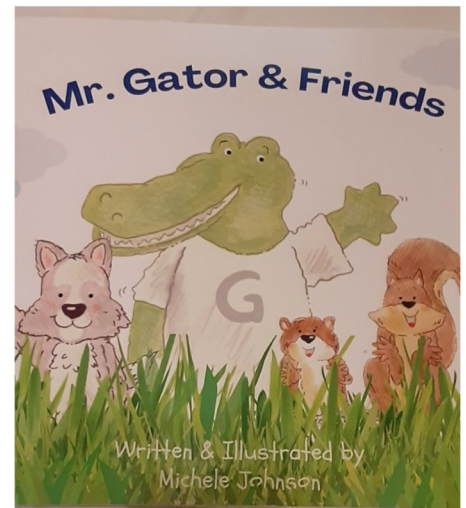


GFWC Wamego Study Club
