Dear GFWC of Kansas Clubwomen, thank you to all the clubwomen who attended the 128th Annual State Convention in Goddard. We accomplished a lot during those 2 days together. On Friday afternoon we took a guided tour of the Wichita Art Museum, and many clubwomen were impressed by the diverse types of artworks on display. Many photos were taken and are post-

ed on the GFWC Kansas Facebook page. We all had an opportunity to listen and get to know our International Leadership Chairman, Dr Susan Gettys. On Friday night she talked about "The Many Facets of Leadership" and non-conventional ways of leading a club. Two examples that she highlighted that I thought might work well for some of our clubs was 1/ co-club presidents and 2/team leading (dividing the calendar into 3or 4-month blocks and having different teams for each block of months – four teams 3 months each).

Other highlights of the convention were that we had five first-time GFWC Kansas clubwomen attendees, five 50+ year GFWC clubwomen, and five past-state presidents all in attendance.

Thank you to the clubwomen from the various 14 clubs in attendance at the state convention for donating 972 items to Simply Hygiene. Megan Kice the director of Simply Hygiene (<u>www.simplyhygiene.org</u>) spoke at the convention about the great need for basic hygiene products for both students and adults. She mentioned that it is important that people have these essential products to promote their health and hope.

We were also able to listen to two speakers, Marlene Merrill and Cille King talk about the proposed Kansas Suffragist Mural. It would be a permanent memorial in the state capital. There is more information about this endeavor in this newsletter.

The National Day of Service (NDS) is scheduled for September 28th. The focus is again Food Insecurity. There is more information about this project included in this newsletter. I challenge all clubs in GFWC Kansas to participate in some way to help alleviate Food Insecurity and Hunger in your community. *"Make the Whirl Go 'Round"* in your community.

This is my last official GFWC Kansas article as your state president. I do not have words to express how thankful I feel for having the honor of leading this incredible organization. It was always a team effort with my incredible and talented executive officers, appointees, and chairman. They all lead with professionalism. Have a blessed summer season with your families and friends. Enjoy each other's company in the great outdoors, even if it is on your back patio.







Kansas Suffragist Memorial Mural

The struggle for women's suffrage and the right to vote across the nation and in Kansas was an important effort for GFWC. Many club women across the United States from Washington, DC to California and Texas to Minnesota, were suffragists. GFWC of Kansas State Presidents Mrs. Mary Tenney Gray, 1881-1883, and Lucy Browne Johnston, 1901-1903, are listed in the National Suffragist Memorial Website.

Women living in Kansas were definitely a part of the suffragist movement. The state of Kansas has an early history of women fighting for the right to vote. Post-statehood in 1867 Kansas was the first state in the nation to battle for full women's suffrage. Many Kansas women along with national suffragists campaigned across the state. This early movement was rejected by male voters and lawmakers.

It wasn't until twenty years later in 1887 that Kansans voted to give women the legal right to vote in municipal elections and not until 1912 when Kansas women won universal suffrage, one of the early states to do so.

The League of Women Voters and American Association of University Women are working to honor those women who fought hard for our voting rights. They too have fought to get the approval from the Capitol Preservation Subcommittee to honor the Suffragist Movement and the Kansas women who had a statewide and national impact in achieving our right to vote.

GFWC of Kansas got involved in this memorial when the Flint Hills club members read an article on the memorial in the Salina newspaper. They felt that Kansas clubwomen should support this effort to get a suffragist memorial inside the Kansas State Capital building in Topeka. The article was sent to Janine Eilert.

On April 20 during the convention Marlene Merrill and Lucille King, Co-Chairs of the Kansas Suffragist Memorial Fund in the Kansas League of Women Voters, attended and spoke to the club members in attendance. They spoke briefly of Kansas suffragist history and the LWV's efforts to honor those women with a memorial in the Kansas statehouse. The Capital Preservation Committee approved a memorial mural to be placed across from the elevator on the first floor. A Manhattan artist, Phyllis Pease, is painting the mural. The speakers passed out the approved rendition of the mural depicting our very own GFWC of Kansas State President, 1901-1903, Lucy Browne Johnston. They also asked for help raising the remaining cost of the mural which is roughly \$50,000. The funds


need to be raised by December 31st.

There are six donation levels in the Kansas Suffragist Memorial Fund. President Janine and I ask each club to donate \$100 to GFWC of Kansas in honor of all of the GFWC women in Kansas who fought for our right to vote. Our "long shot" goal is to reach the \$5,000 level named after our very own Lucy B Johnston. This will have to include personal donations as well. Your checks should be made payable to GFWC Kansas and mailed to our State Secretary, Margaret Ohmes. GFWC of Kansas will write the check to the Fund. Please have your check to us by December 10, 2024.

If any of you have questions or would like a copy of the approved Mural let me know, please. I can answer or find the answer and send copies of the mural. You can also google Kansas Suffragist Memorial Fund for more information. You should be able to access the mural as well.

The Demon of Unrest





Legislation and Public Policy

News from the State Convention

Congratulations to Lawrence Classics for being awarded a Certificate of Appreciation for excellence in legislative and public policy service. Club members provided 80 hours of

service to the League of Women Voters!

A presentation on the impact of "Period Poverty" was introduced. According to the Alliance for Period Poverty: "Two in five people struggle to purchase period supplies due to lack of income. This is called period poverty, and chances are we each know someone who has experienced this need – a neighbor, a co-worker, a friend. No student should have to miss school, no adult should have to miss work, and no person should have to miss out on daily life because they are unable to afford the basic necessities they require to thrive."

Kansas HB 2727 was introduced during

this legislative session to require all public schools and public postsecondary educational institution to make feminine hygiene products available at no cost to students and establishing a state grant program for such purpose. The bill was not granted a hearing and died in committee.

Karaline Scott and Anna Peery, students from Goddard High School explained their work to provide courtesy baskets of hygiene products in restrooms for their fellow students. They explained their advocacy to work with administration to improve access to free hygiene products.

Karaline and Anna are Seniors at Goddard High School who will be graduating in May. Karaline will attend Wichita State University and Anna will attend Kansas State University in the fall. Both plan to pursue degrees in the engineering field.


The two young women received the Goddard Woman's Club 2024 President's Award for Leadership from Gail Jamison.


Clubs Helping Clubs

National Day of Service

The National Day of Service (NDS) is a day (September 28th, 2024) in which all of GFWC comes together in service to highlight an area of need, take action to address the need, and raise public awareness about its importance. State federations and clubs are encouraged to join in and organize community service programs (CSPs) in their communities as part of the NDS. It's also a great opportunity to invite guests to participate in your NDS activities and introduce them to the benefits of GFWC.

This year's NDS issue of focus is again Food Insecurity and Hunger. To initiate the planning process, GFWC encourages you to contact your local food banks and food pantries — wherever people go for food — to find out how best to be of service. For example, a club can sponsor a food bank, pantry, or food program to organize a volunteer activity with fellow club members, family, and friends. Ask every member of your club to invite a friend who is not presently a member to participate and experience GFWC in action. Use the activity to motivate and inspire your friend to join. The benefits of community service not only make a person feel good, but it helps to build meaningful friendships and bonds that will last a lifetime.

Here are suggestions for NDS activities: Volunteer at a Local Food Bank

- **Food Drives:** Connect directly with the local food bank to determine how your club can be of service. They will welcome the support and donation of time and food.
- **Raise Awareness About Hunger:** Reach out to your local media to introduce NDS and the cause being promoted. Ask the reporter to mention NDS and how people can participate and donate. Also, use social media to discuss food insecurity with members of your community, clubs, schools, church groups, and others.
- Advocate to End Food Insecurity: Use GFWC's Legislative Action Center (LAC) to interact with your federal and state elected officials to advance a bill or introduce legislation that helps to end hunger by funding programs specific to the issue.

Information and updates about NDS will be in the weekly electronic newsletter *GFWC News & Notes*, Facebook, Instagram, and website, www.GFWC.org. Every week until September 28, GFWC will make announcements, provide project ideas, and discuss food insecurity. Stay tuned for additional resources including a tool kit and a media kit.




Six Things to Know About 'Forever Chemicals'

What are "forever chemicals" you might ask, and the answer is they are chemicals that have a special bond of carbon and fluorine atoms, making them incredibly strong and resistant to heat, water, oil and dirt. For that reason, PFAS are used for everyday items as varied as microwave popcorn bags, water-repellent clothing and stain-resistant carpets. PFAS are also in firefighting foam, cosmetics, shampoos, toys and even dental floss. **Where are PFAS?**

Everywhere, including drinking water. The indestructible nature that makes PFAS useful in some products also makes them harmful to human health. The chemicals are virtually indestructible and do not fully degrade, accumulating in the environment and the human body. The chemicals are so ubiquitous that they can be found in the blood of almost every person in the country. One recent government study detected PFAS chemicals in nearly half of the nation's tap water. A global study of more than 45,000 water samples around the world found that about 31 percent of tested groundwater samples that weren't near any obvious source of contamination had PFAS levels considered harmful to human health. For the first time, the U.S. government is requiring municipal water systems to detect and remove PFAS from drinking water.

What does PFAS do to the body?

According to the E.P.A., exposure to PFAS can cause damage to the liver and immune system and has been linked to low birth weight, birth defects and developmental delays as well as increased risk of some prostate, kidney and testicular cancers. New research published in the past year found links between PFAS exposure and a delay in the onset of puberty in girls, leading to a higher incidence of breast cancer, and thyroid disease; a decrease in bone density in teenagers, potentially leading to osteoporosis; and an increased risk of Type 2 diabetes in women

Why didn't the E.P.A. regulate PFAS in water sooner?

Many environmental advocates argue that PFAS contamination should have been dealt with long ago. "For generations, PFAS chemicals slid off every federal environmental law like a fried egg off a Teflon pan," said Ken Cook, president and co-founder of the Environmental Working Group, a nonprofit advocacy group.

Activists blame chemical companies, which for decades hid evidence of the dangers of PFAS, according to lawsuits and <u>a peer-reviewed</u> <u>study</u>, published in the Annals of Global Health, of previously secret industry documents. What can we do?

If you already own something that contains PFAS, it's safe to use as long as you're using it correctly (for instance: don't overheat your non-stick pans). When they wear out look for another alternative when it's time to replace them. "You can wear your jacket, you can use your pan, but don't buy another one [that was manufactured with PFAS],"

EWG.org has an <u>interactive PFAS con-</u> <u>tamination map</u> that currently shows public and private water systems known to be contaminated with toxic PFAS at thousands of locations. The true scale of PFAS contamination is expected to be much greater, and EWG will be updating the map with more sites soon.

Call your city water facility and ask if they are meeting the new EPA standards for drinking water. Do not throw old water bottles out near lakes, streams or at the ocean while on vacation. Stay aware of the environmental issues close to you.

This is my last contribution to the GFWC Clubwoman. I decided to take a break as I have been in this position for six years. Blessings to you all




