Later on, Ron and Jewell Thomas also owned the building and operated a Rock Shop and Gift Shop known as the Rusty Can. Most recently,



the Thomas' sold out to the current owners, Dennis and Summer Lewchuk.

Let's all give a big WELCOME to Dennis and Summer! Their plans for the building have not been set in stone as of yet. The talk around town has been that it will be a restaurant, a convenience store, or maybe even a Pizza parlor! We will have to sit back and wait to see what Dennis and Summer will do. Going to State!

The spring of 1960 brought the fruition of the American Legion Program of the 1950s and it blossomed. The Mitchell High Loggers went on a run that would take them to the state semi-finals.

The 50s slowly crept upon us, even the clocks seemed to run slower then. People's entertainment was self-made. We didn't get electricity until 1954. TV even later. Enter the American Legion, they had the organizing skills, and the revenue, and most of them had the kids. Baseball became the entertainment. The team played other towns that had Legion posts - Dayville, Fossil, Spray, etc. The local merchants had a hand in it also, they could sponsor a player and the business name would be placed on the back of their jersey. Players were between the ages of 10 and 18, though some towns may have stretched the top age but they made them shave before the game. When it became obvious that they had stretched the age too tight then that player was moved up to the town team. When you reached the town team level you had to have another skill, how to fight and defend yourself. It seemed when an umpire couldn't settle a dispute it would be solved another way, sometimes the umpire was involved.

Baseball season came in like a lion as did the weather in March, when a ground ball was hit into the outfield it had to be rolled back, from the accumulated snow, it was heavy to throw. The weather was so bad that the groundhog came out 2 days in a row so we could expect 12 weeks of bad weather.

A lackluster season in '59 dictated no pressure was on us, no team feared us, and expectations were very low. The first three non-league games we won against Fossil, Prineville J.V., and Sisters. Our confidence was high until we were humbled by Prineville and Fossil. We beat Sisters again before we started League play, now would be the time to introduce the team. Senior leadership was supplied by Bob Hale and Calloll Messenger. Carroll was our catcher, a good gloveman who had a great arm, and was better than average with the bat. Bob was blessed with speed so he could beat out hits and steal bases. Had a good eye, and packed a mean bat. Bob was the team leader. I didn't agree with him always, maybe because he and I were cousins.

Six on the team were juniors, 5 were starters. The most valuable on the team was Pete Migun a transplant from El Central, California. Pete was our pitcher, a left-hander who could throw a curve around a corner. Pete thought he was the best and the prettiest. He may have been right. Sure didn't have much trouble with batters or the girls. Fact is that Crook County Cowboys recruited for the next year using girls as bait! Terry Schnee was at first base at 6'3".

Had good range, a great glove, OK with the bat. Pete William was the right fielder, the coach hid him out there and hoped a ball didn't come his way. Pete could not catch or throw but packed a great bat. It may not have been all his fault because he wore glasses that looked like the bottom of Coke bottles. Bob Seaton held down left field. He had a good glove, arm, and bat fair speed. I felt more comfortable playing beside him than Pete because I was center field. When I started playing High School ball, I was the lead-off hitter and I didn't feel any more comfortable than playing beside Pete. I had a good eye, fair with the bat, slow with the feet but great with the glove. Marc Anderson was our 3rd Baseman. Had a great arm, good with the glove and bat but he broke his hand in a play at 3rd base and missed the first half of the season. Fred Harnden took over at first after Marc's mishap, with his athletic skills did a great job, he sometimes pitched. John McCulloch was the and baseman. Had quick hands, a good eye and good with a bat. The last one of our sophomores was Paul Lollar. He also was a gifted player who could play any position including pitcher. John misener was the only freshman, he filled in where needed while he honed his skills.

We started league play at Dayville, their field was west of town, the outfield was surrounded by a massive log deck. A homer would be to park one on the deck. Migun was having a great game, a one hitter left handed. Coach O'Halloran called time in one half of the fourth inning, went to the mound packing a glove, Dayville's neurotic coach wanted to know if we were changing pitchers, Coach O'Halloran said, "NO! We are changing arms." Migun threw a 1 hitter left-handed and a 3 hitter right-handed. It was our easiest win of the season. Long Creek was up next and we had no problem with them. We traveled to Monument and two events I remember from that game. I was behind on count o - 2, the next pitch was 2 feet over my head, I swang at it, ran to 1st. Coach came out and questioned my decision to swing to which I replied, "Well, I am on base." End of question. Later I was on third with one out, the ball was hit to right field in foul ground, it was caught I tagged up and scored after the catch. I didn't even know you could do that! What a coaching moment! Three games in and we are undefeated in League. Competition would be harder for the next two games. Prarie City had a good team but we prevailed. Mount Vernon was also undefeated the next game would be the league championship game. Luckily we had them at home. Paul Ables was 6'4" and their thrower he could burn them. Jamie Woods was a behemoth of a man, 6' tall 225 LBS. He had packed into one hand more athletic ability than I had in my whole body. That day belonged to us as we won

13 to 4, I believe.

A new season now started as we were going to the district play-off. We were blessed because we had home-field advantage, sort of. It was set that we would play at Davison Field in Prineville. Mitchell was playing against Umatilla from eastern Oregon. I don't remember a lot about the game after 63 years, but I do remember we broke about 4 bats out of our 12. My Dad and Bob McColloch went down to Ernie's Sport Shop and purchased enough to finish the game. The team arrived in Prineville Friday, spent the night in the Ochoco Inn. Coach O'Halloran spent most of the night at the Cinnabar Lounge, everybody else had a curfew! If we win this game we will have a plan so this doesn't occur again. We did win the game - I don't remember the score. So we were up at the same place next Saturday playing Adrian from far eastern Oregon. We checked in at the Ochoco Inn once again late in the afternoon, went out to Davidson to practice. We ate early dinner and retired to our rooms, we now implemented our plan to stop the coach from his appointment at the Cinnabar Loungs. We waited until he was in the shower, broke into his room, and removed all his clothes. We met him early the next morning, he had stayed in his room all night and now we returned his clothes, and he really looked refreshed.

Up to now, we didn't know we were that good. No one had any expectations of us. We were getting into the papers, folks were bragging about us, furnishing steak dinners for the team, the pressure was starting to build. Until we played them, I didn't know Adrian was in Oregon. We were victorious in the contest, we took full credit because we kept the coach fresh and rested. On to State and the semi-finals, but we have to travel to Merrill which is southeast of Klamath Falls.

The bus ride to Klamath Falls was long and slow but as always we entertained ourselves aggravating the girls and each other. We finally reached Klamath early afternoon, checked into the hotel in downtown. The Wi-Ne-Ma, I believe. Four people to a room, Pete Williams was one of our four. We had a room at sidewalk level, Pete took a shower, modesty not being his forte (remember I mentioned the Coke bottle lenses??) Walked up to the street window and proceeded to start to dry himself, completely unaware that we had opened the curtains. Pete put on quite a show for the passer-byers until he became aware! That evening, we borrowed Coach O'Halloran's station wagon paired up, and went to a movie. I am not going to mention any names, some are still trying to live it down as to who they were paired off with!

The next morning, we ate breakfast, layed around the



room, then got lunch, boarded the bus, and headed to Merrill south of Klamath. We had picked up a local paper, the sport page had write-ups about both teams. Somehow they got my name wrong, in Klamath County my name was Stan Cannon. I got teased more by my own team than the opposing one.

The game was a close 3 to 2 until the fourth inning. Merrill had a man on first and second, the batter found out where we had Pete hidden. I knew he wasn't going to get it, so I charged the ball and his position. I grabbed the ball and summoned all the strength, and adrenaline as I threw that ball. That ball was supposed to go to home plate, but I overcharged, overthrew, the ball landed 20 yards behind the plate. I couldn't see it but they say I scattered the Merrill fans. Two more runs scored making it Merrill 5 - Mitchell 3. Terry Schnee was at bat with 2 on. He got hit by a pitch. Umpire declared he didn't try to move away and called it a strike. Next pitch he grounded to first. Game over. Big argument but to no avail. We lost 5 to 3. The next week Merrill went on to win State. The bus ride down was long, but the ride back was longer.

There is a postscript - Tom Campbell a long-time Mitchellite was living in Merrill, but was not at the game. He heard about the results in The Rhubarb Daily News. Tom asked how many Merrill fans were killed. He was told none, and he stated, "You people don't know how lucky you were!"

I made a two-run error on my throw but I left Klamath County and Merrill fans knowing that Stan Cannon had one hell of an arm!








Unusual Find




LOGIC PROBLEM


