Mitchell Grinch Busters to Host Annual Chili Cook-Off Fundraiser





League Champions - Baseball - Mitchell High - 1940

When I was a senior at Mitchell High School, I played shortstop on our baseball team. We won the league that year. Our coach, Jim Mulvahill, was the best coach in this part of Oregon. Our team consisted of Red Puckett, Van Woodward, Loren Shoemaker, Ken Brookshire, Lyle Cole, Patrick O'Kelley, Earl Norris, Beryl Williams, three other players made the traveling squad, and I can't recall their names. One hot afternoon, we traveled to Spray. Now, Spray had a great baseball team, but ours was better. In the first inning, Lyle Cole came up to bat three times and he made all three outs in that inning. We all batted around twice, and Lyle came up for the third time and struck out. As I recall, the final score was 39 to 1.

To win the League Championship, we had to get by Wheeler County, and this team had three top-notch pitchers. I believe Milo Prindle could throw a baseball through a two-inch plank. Anyway, it was no picnic to get hit by one of his fastballs. We won the ball game in the first inning by simply convincing them that they could not win. We played errorless ball and won 8 to 5.

There was a big celebration when we arrived back in Mitchell. Graduation was next and I was looking forward to Oregon State College.



WRITE or RONG by Cliff Heck

I have been writing short humor stories for a newspaper in Washington State for 16 Years now and decided to publish a book of the same genre ("In Rural Districts") with all new, unpublished stories, as it didn't seem fair to me that I should try to sell my readers stories they may have already read.

The debut of my little humor collection resulted in my being asked for my first interview on what it was like being an "author!" I demurred, saying I considered myself more of a "writer" than an "author," as my blockbuster tell-it-all novel. "Sixteen Minutes to Moscow," wasn't quite ready for publication yet. Still, I wouldn't want to be rude..."Who are your favorite authors, Mr. Hack?" the reporter inquired. "Ah, ah, that's 'Heck," I quickly corrected her, "H-E-C-K, an anglicization of the German 'Hecht' or Pike fish. Sometimes I consider using the name 'Pike' as my nom de plume, but I've been using 'Heck' for so long..." My inquisitor stared at me blankly for several seconds before she repeated, "Your favorite authors?" "Oh, the usual," I replied, "Mark Twain, Will Rogers, Garrison Keillor, Pat McManus, Shakespeare... "Who?" My inquisitor asked, scribbling madly. "Shakespeare," I repeated with a smile, thinking she was just trying to be cute. "No, no, the one just before him," she responded. "Pat somebody?"

I am always astounded that so many people seem to have never heard of Pat McManus. I know, the reporter from Windchill Union High School was only 15, and Pat has been dead for six years, so if she was only nine when Pat passed at the age of 84, it's unlikely she would remember him, even if her Dad had all his books, but how quickly they forget. I gave her a quick synopsis of Pat's career but then went on with the interview as her eyes began to glaze over.

I first read Pat McManus on the pages of "Field & Stream" around 1977 and for the following five years; then, he moved to "Outdoor Life" in 1983 for an additional 26 years. Later, he made 15 books of collections of his short stories. Then he wrote 6 mystery stories in the "Sheriff Bo Tully" series, followed by some other stuff, my favorite being "A Deer on A Bicycle," a treatise on writing humor. And although I've never gotten to see one of them, he still found the time to write five humorous plays that have gone on for over 1600 performances.

I noticed several things in common that Pat and I shared. Pat was raised out in the sticks near Sandpoint, Idaho, while I grew up on Thompson Creek in Oregon, a similarly remote wilderness. (We didn't get electricity until 1953! Yes, that means we had to deal with outhouses and kerosine lamps!) Pat and I shared a birth month (August), but he was 9 years older. I identified with

Pat as soon as I discovered his writing, as all his incidents seemed so familiar.

Pat's father died when he was only 6 and my father left us when I was about eleven. (No, Dad didn't die, he just left, "going to look for work in Idaho;" I didn't see him again for 14 years!)

Pat married a lady named Darlene, (that he referred to as "Bun,") and I married a lady named Marlene, (that I always refer to as "Marlene.") You can see which one of us was destined to be a real writer.

I only met Pat once at his book signing for "A Deer on a Bicycle." I told him I was also a writer and had first published (and was paid for!) a short story in "The Oregon Farmer" around about 1952. (I didn't mention the "pay" was only a dollar!) I could see he was very impressed by my résumé, but he signed my copy of "A Deer on a Bicycle" anyway. I didn't get a chance to tell him I was writing for a newspaper, as he had suddenly gotten very busy...

"How long have you been writing?" Sisi (as that seemed to be my interrogator's name) asked. "Ever since my mother unwisely handed me a pencil and some paper," I replied, "Just before I started the first grade." "You could write before you started the first grade?" my inquisitor repeated, wide-eyed. "I didn't say anyone could have possibly read any of it as it was more like hieroglyphics," I laughed. "But at least I was trying to put my thoughts down on paper!" There's that blank look again. "That was a reference to an ancient language," I tried to explain. "Where do you get your idea for a story?" Sisi asked, frowning and trying to continue. "I just come across something that seems interesting in my day-to-day life and write about it. At many writing conferences, I've





Terry Schnee

I lost a good friend in September 2024. Terry Schnee and I walked a long trail together. When we started school in 1949, there were 26 students in our first-grade class. In 1961, at our high school graduation, there were four of us who went through all 12 years



together—Marc Anderson, Bob Seaton, Terry Schnee, and Dan Cannon.

Church provides a memory - at youth Bible Study, after the last prayer, with head still bowed, Terry whispered, "We have the shiniest shoes here."

The Fall of 1958 saw us entering High School as Freshmen, and we had to endure the initiation process. Terry dressed in a diaper with headgear and a bottle; I was in a bikini, padded, of course. It was so cold I had goosebumps bigger than the pads.

Terry was still growing, over 6 feet, and climbing. His legs grew long and unshapely, hence his nickname "bird legs." His height came in handy. He was our center in basketball and our first baseman in baseball.

The one time Terry angered me was when he came through our yard gate chasing after Paul Loccar - he threw something, and it hit me square in the face. As he came by me, I grabbed him and down we went. When we hit the ground, I heard and felt a snapped bone in my ankle. I lost baseball season that year, but I forgave him. I evened the score the next year when I hit him with a baseball. I learned a lesson the year before - I ran away from him especially since he had a bat in hand.

Willard W. Webb was our superintendent during our senior year. Terry and I both had run-ins with the tall Texan. Webb once called me a smart ass, to which I retorted that I couldn't see any reason or advantage to being a dumb one.

Terry and I were hanging out one Sunday afternoon not looking forward to school or Mr. Webb on Monday.
Terry said, "I wish that S.O.B. would wreck and kill
himself. You could imagine our astonishment when we
got the news that Mr. Webb was in a very serious car
crash. He spent many months in the hospital and rehab.
I never angered Terry for the rest of his life.

The absence of Mr. Webb left Terry and me without a teacher for our office practice class. Terry and I

considered ourselves co-superintendents of the school. We answered the phone, relayed messages, and did attendance reports - things we had seen Mr. Webb do! Terry did spill a bottle of black ink on the cushion of his desk chair, which we could not clean up so we inked the rest of it black. Terry had failed freshman math and without that credit, he would not graduate. Now that we had the keys and were co-superintendents, we had the ability to make sure Terry passed that math class. We were so proud of ourselves when we found his transcript. That proud disappeared when we discovered that the old S.O.B. had already changed the F to a C. Webb didn't want Terry for another year as Terry didn't want Webb.

The Graduation Class of 1961 saw two more students joining the group - Irene Misener and Pete Williams. They came from Twickenham School when they were sophomores.

School was over, and we all went different ways. Marc went to Willamette U. Irene went to beauty school, Bob went to millwork in Prineville, Terry went to Portland, Pete became a sheep shearer, and Dan went to work for his Dad. Their lives were about to be turned upside down.

A war many miles away saw these young men looking at draft notices. Marc was deferred because of school, Bob got married, Terry enlisted and went to Germany, Pete also went to Germany, and Dan was drafted and sent to Alaska after Basic Training. They wouldn't take Irene because she was too mean! Marc was the only one sent to Vietnam - which he survived.

Terry came home to bury George when he passed. He called me up, wanting to know if I knew anyone that would do a service for his dad. I made him sweat for a while then I volunteered. George had amassed many home rentals, plus his store, station, and other properties. Terry put everything on the block for sale and in five or six years had dispersed it all.

Terry's life had its peaks and valleys, like us all, and he made the most of it. He found a good woman (Sue) to share his life with and raised a beautiful family! Thanks for the memories.

P.S. I didn't tell them about the rock fights with Dick and Larry Gabie.




