Mitchell Grinch Busters Host 3rd Annual Chili Cook-Off on Halloween Neighborhood Night

This Halloween, Main Street in Mitchell will come alive with lights, laughter, and plenty of spooky fun as the town gathers for **Halloween Neighborhood Night**, a family festival filled with contests, games, food, and community spirit.

At the heart of the festivities is the **3rd Annual Chili Cook-Off Fundraiser**, hosted by the Mitchell Grinch Busters at the Little Pine Lodge. The Cook-Off has become a cherished tradition, raising funds for the *Mitchell Sentinel*—our not-for-profit hometown paper—and for the Grinch Busters' community Christmas projects, including Main Street holiday decorations and the annual Christmas Tree Lighting.

A Festival for the Whole Family

Halloween Neighborhood Night is more than just a fundraiser—it's a full evening of activities for all ages:

- **Coffin Races** at Wheeler County Trading Co. (Safety check at 7:00, races at 7:15)
Gravity-powered "coffins" built by locals compete for trophies, bragging rights, and just plain fun.
- **Halloween Costume Contest** at Tiger Town Brew Co.
Trophies and prizes for spookiest, funniest, most original, scariest, and coolest costumes.
- **Carnival Games, Haunted House, Spooky Story Contest, Toy Stop, Coloring & Guess-How-Many Contests, Haunted Ride, and More**—all happening up and down Main Street.

Why It Matters

For those unfamiliar with the Grinch Busters, it all began in September 2022, when a small group of community members stepped up to decorate Main Street for Christmas after learning that the City Decorating Committee would not complete the task. We gathered lights, crafted wreaths, and made beautiful decorations, transforming Main Street into a warm and festive wonderland. We also organized a town Christmas Tree Lighting in the City Park with hot chocolate and refreshments, and Sleigh races down Main Street. To spread the word about these events, we sent out a 2-page newsletter to the Mitchell community—and that became the first issue of the current *Mitchell Sentinel*!

The Chili Cook-Off supports both the *Mitchell Sentinel* and the Mitchell Grinch Busters to keep our town festive and connected. Since 2022, the Grinch Busters have decorated Main Street with lights and wreaths, hosted the Community Christmas Tree Lighting, and helped sponsor events that bring neighbors together. Halloween Neighborhood Night is an extension of that mission—an evening that showcases the best of small-town Mitchell: creativity, fun, and community pride.

Mitchell Ambulance Chat

October 2025

Hello and welcome everyone, I hope you all had a great summer!! Fall is coming soon, and it's time to stock up and prepare for the cold winter months ahead. Stock up the freezers, get the firewood split and stacked, and break out the winter clothes.

Winter weather brings its own challenges to us with the ambulance service. Icy, snow-covered roads slow our response times down considerably. The medivac helicopters are often unable to fly due to the weather, and our transport times are longer also. Slow down and leave more room between yourself and others when driving, and avoid sudden turns or braking when conditions are unfavorable. Dress for the weather outside when traveling and not for the heated interior of your vehicle. If you should crash or break down, your shorts and t-shirt are not going to keep you warm until help arrives!! Carry blankets or a sleeping bag in the back seat to keep you warm should you become stranded. Carry water in a thermos or other container that will insulate it and prevent freezing, and pack some snacks in a bag to take also. Let someone know when and where you're going, and check in with them when you arrive at your destination. It's easy to slide off the road when icy, and your tracks will be covered with snow, and hard to see. Prompt rescue is vital in the cold weather the sooner you're missed, the sooner rescue agencies can be notified to search for you!!

Now is a good time to check your heater exhaust in your home, make sure it's clear and not blocked. Carbon monoxide poisoning is a common cause of death in the winter months. Carbon monoxide is an odorless and tasteless gas that displaces the oxygen in your bloodstream, preventing your vital organs from getting the oxygen they need. Headache and dizziness are two early signs of carbon monoxide poisoning, along with nausea, fatigue, and confusion. Should you or someone else start to experience these symptoms, remove the person from the area immediately to fresh air. Symptoms should start to subside with fresh air, but can take hours to totally resolve, depending on the exposure. We can provide supplemental oxygen to help you and transport you to the hospital for further testing and treatment. Do not go back into the environment until the cause of the carbon monoxide leak is identified and repaired.

Clean the chimney on your wood stove; the creosote buildup can catch fire and burn your house down!! Once a year cleaning is a must, and twice a year is even better. Be sure your door latch is working properly and securely latches the door shut. Burning wood rolling out of the stove causes many house fires in the winter. Keep flammables away from the stove and any other heat sources. Catalytic heaters are generally safe for

indoor use but should be ventilated. Do not use a propane or charcoal grill for heat in any enclosed space!! The combustion process releases large amounts of carbon monoxide due to the incomplete combustion process.

There would be no time for fun!

The first group laid the foundation and set this operation into motion.

Then they waited for the Germans, who were coming from across the Ocean.

The finest off-road vehicles were procured, no matter what the Cost.

After four weeks of the Germans driving, it looks like some of those Rigs might be a total loss.

Some are bent, some are broke, and some are badly smashed.

But worst off are the two Deer they hit and really trashed.

Bouncing along our roads, the flats they had were many.

Having flats in this country is a way of life, and you don't hear me crying, any.

If you happened to see more Beer trucks on the road, I will tell you why.

These Germans love their Beer and every Brand and Brew they want to try!

If I ever go to Germany after seeing these guys drive, I have a solution——right on.

Gov. Kotek Slams Gas Tax Repeal Effort

The Senate this week just passed the \$4.3 billion gas tax/wage tax transportation package. They rammed this massive tax with as little public notice and input as possible and with over **93% opposition** based on Capitol testimony.

Now, thanks to State Senator Bruce Starr, State Representative Ed Diehl, and Jason Williams of the Taxpayers Association, they are the Chief Petitioners who are filing paperwork for a referendum petition to give voters a right to vote on this massive gas tax that will cost many families \$300 in higher expenses.

Now, Governor Kotek is asking voters NOT to sign the petition giving voters the right to vote.

KPIC [reports](#) on Kotek's response to a right-to-vote-on-gas-tax petition, "*She encouraged Oregonians to "think twice" about potentially supporting a referendum, saying it could compromise the safety of roads and the security of some jobs at ODOT.*" In terms of referral, Oregonians certainly have the right, and there is a process to refer to something they don't agree with. Frankly, I would urge Oregonians to think about signing on to a referral that will take away our basic ability as Oregonians to keep our roads operating," said Kotek. "Let's all come together as a state to make sure we have the roads we need."

How can Oregon come together, when Kotek shuts voters out of the process?


Even worse, the petition to give voters the right to vote on this gas tax is frozen until Governor Kotek officially signs the bill. The longer Governor Kotek waits on the bill, the shorter the window people will have to gather signatures within the 90-day window to refer a tax. ■

Unforgettable Folks: The Legends Next Door

In this series, I've introduced you to several interesting folks I've been fortunate enough to know. These individuals, full of wisdom and personality, left an impression on me that hasn't faded with time. They weren't scholars in the traditional sense, but their intelligence was undeniable, shaped by experience, resilience, and an innate understanding of people and the world around them. This story is about Ray.

RAY

Ray was born, raised, and would spend most of his life in Mitchell. Ray, like a lot of boys, was small for his age, which enhanced his toughness, but that toughness was put to the test when Mitchell boys traveled to Mt. Vernon to settle a score. Ray Gage, Lyle Cole, Doug Woodward, Walt Norton, Coon Maxwell, and Kent Powell failed that test miserably as the Mt. Vernon boys passed in flying colors. A large country boy by the name of Stanley Hobgood took all the aggression of the Mitchell boys. Later, Jenks Tanler told me he was the only one from Mt. Vernon that got whipped. Those Mitchell boys went on to toughen up as they all served the USA in WWII. Walt didn't make it back.

Ray joined the Marine Corps. They offered structure and discipline, which Ray had not been exposed to. He had to learn the hard way, which meant extra duty. Ray told me he was burning garbage. He didn't state where he got the ammunition, but a whole case was placed into the fire, the whole camp came alive, and when the ammo was spent, his commanding officer and sergeant were hollering, "Gage, you might as well come in; we know you are out here some place." Extra duty was again in place, but you can bet there was no more burning garbage involved! I wish I could remember the other tales he told, but in life, Ray was just getting started. No one was more delighted that the war was over than the corps, so they sent Ray home.

Ray started working as a faller in the logging woods, and by this time, he had become a practical and a non-practical joker; he kept everyone on alert! The one time the boys of Mitchell got the gotter.

Homecoming in 1960, a big bonfire was planned. The location was next to Ray's place. Junk lumber was gathered from all over town, piled next to Ray's place. We thought the old outhouse at Rays was abandoned, so it was used as a topper for the pile. 12 healthy young men had no problem hoisting it on the pile. Needless to say, it worked (burnt) beautifully until Monday when Ray reported it missing, hell came to school that Monday. We were chastised severely, but after that, I don't know how much Ray got for his missing outhouse or who paid it. Ray called Bob Woodward, representing the phone company, and he stated that they were experiencing static on the line and could he blow into the line. Ray repeated this

several times, and after Bob was out of breath, he stated, "That did it, you blew all the bird poop off the line." Then hung up!

I was always on the alert and guard for him pulling something on me! He started by asking if I knew I had won the garden tractor at the County fair? I didn't buy a ticket; someone must have bought one for you, for you sure enough won it! This went on for two days. "When are you going over to pick it up?" he asked. Then came the clincher, it will be handy for you, it has a special attachment on it, so you can pull your head out of your rear end! Maybe then he was even for burning his outhouse.

Dad and I were building our new store in 1969; Ray was our excavator; he dug a water line from across the creek, up the bank, up the front. He stopped the backhoe and stated I lost my knife, I am done until I find it. For over two hours, we searched, sifted, shoveled--this must be a buck, Gerber Super Knife to expend this much work to find it. We finally found it--it was an Imperial two-blade with one blade broken off, and 1 of the handles was missing. I told him we would have been better off if it would have remained lost.

Ray had a rental house in Prineville; his renters trashed it, wouldn't pay their rent, he exhausted all the ways to resolve it, law and all, still to no avail. This is how Ray solved it: he got a crew together and tore off the roof. Next rainstorm, they moved. Problem was solved after he finished the demolition! He called it self- eviction!

Ray was in our store when Al Clark, a newly transplanted Californian, asked me to service his work truck. He was emphatic that I should grease everything! I parked the truck outside for Al to pick up after hours. While out, Ray slipped back, greased the steering wheel, gear shift nob, heater controls, door and window handles. An angry AL had a stern conversation with innocent me later; it didn't take long to figure the real culprit. Two months later, I discovered Ray's truck parked at the Gable Creek Road while he graded the road. In the back of the truck was a can of grease, 5-gallon bucket, so I knew there was enough to do the job. Right then and there, I got even for Al and myself. Ray never said a word about it; he wasn't going to give satisfaction to the guilty party.

Family caught the wrath of Ray's humor; his mother-in-law returned home after a stay at her daughter's house, only to find that Ray had sewn every pant leg together she had packed. The first time she tried on a pair, she liked to have broken her leg and her toes!

In 1964, the Christmas flood washed all the road out. Ray, being the county boss in south County, had one truck, Bay City loader, and Gene Jordan on this side of the river. He needed more dump trucks, so he put together a crew of Bob and Jim Woodward, Hoot Powell, Dan Cannon, and a couple more guys from Prineville who had their own trucks. With this motley crew in three weeks he had the roads passable. I never had so much fun in my life; all of the crew were carded characters. Ray retired after many years with the County Road Department. Folks always called him old high blade, said he never lowered the blade because he didn't like to change the blade bits! ■



Oregon's mis-spending of critical health care Medicaid funds was exposed on national TV. Oregon raised 77 health care fees in 2022, while at the same time, politicians waste healthcare dollars on cooking classes, air conditioners, and mini-fridges. (CBS 4/29/24)



Oregon ranks as the nation's #3 food stamp state. Roughly 17% of Oregonians, 1 in 6, receive food stamps. Users can buy unlimited junk food on food stamps, such as candy, potato chips, ice cream, and luxury foods like steak and lobster. Your tax dollars pay for people's unhealthy eating habits and then pay again when they enroll in government-run health care to treat their preventable diseases caused by being unhealthy.

I didn't raise your taxes. They did it for me.

Politicians invent new schemes to raise taxes without a vote. Kotek drafted HB 2528, giving the Oregon Health Authority extraordinary powers to extend tobacco taxes to other similar products without a public hearing or a vote of your elected representatives. It also empowers the agency to ban any nicotine product it dislikes without a public vote. An agency-enacted ban could destroy a hundred local small family businesses and local neighborhood shops overnight. Politicians crave this new power to ban things and raise taxes without ever having to take a vote or take the blame.






