## IP 28 Raises Questions for Rural Communities

A proposed statewide measure—**Initiative Petition 28 (IP 28)**—may soon go before Oregon voters, and it's already drawing strong opinions across the state.

Supporters say it's about protecting animals from harm.

Opponents warn it could dramatically affect everyday life in rural communities like ours.

Here's a simple breakdown of what it means. 🐄 (ranching) 🦌 (hunting) 🐟 (fishing)

IP 28 would make it illegal to intentionally injure or kill most animals, unless a limited exception applies—such as self-defense or veterinary care. While that may sound straightforward, the key issue lies in what the measure would change.

Under current Oregon law, certain activities are allowed through specific exemptions. These include farming, raising livestock, hunting, fishing, and pest control. IP 28 proposes removing many of those exemptions.

Without them, actions that are currently legal could become criminal offenses. Supporters—who refer to the measure as the **PEACE Act (People for the Elimination of Animal Cruelty Exemptions)**—say Oregon's existing animal cruelty laws leave too many animals unprotected. They believe the law should apply equally to all animals, regardless of their use.

Opponents argue the measure goes much further than it appears on the surface. They say it could effectively ban hunting and fishing, disrupt ranching and livestock production, and impact Oregon's food supply and rural economy.

For communities like Mitchell and across Wheeler County, this issue hits close to home. Hunting, ranching, and agriculture are not just traditions—they are a way of life and a critical part of the local economy.

IP 28 is currently in the signature-gathering phase. Supporters must collect more than 117,000 valid signatures to qualify the measure for the ballot. If it qualifies, Oregon voters will ultimately decide its fate.

To better understand the potential impact, it's important to look at how broadly the measure could apply.

Down went Buckley with three 38 wounds in his chest.

A crowd gathered around and coincided poor old Buckley would end soon, start his eternal rest.

Someone in the crowd said 'Let's get him inside, make him comfortable, put something under his head!'

'Here's a blanket, cover him up, he looks cold, and in a few minutes he will surely be dead.'

Thirty minutes passed, Buckley hung in there, and Buckley didn't die.

'How about loading him in a car and taking him to the hospital? Don't you think we ought to try?'

They loaded him into Hudspeth's station wagon and off to Prineville they sped

It was truly a miracle that Buckley was still holding on and not dead



At Mossy Rock, the driver lost control of the car and rolled it, as they failed to make the turn

The men ascended from the wreck; it was another miracle they were unhurt. Buckley was a screaming, 'Get me out before it catches fire, and I burn.'

They dragged him out, laid him beside the road, and hiked to Beaver Guard station and called for another car. The emergency crew promised themselves to drive safer and slower, because they really hadn't made it that far!

As the relief car braked to a stop, they threw Buckley in, and off they went

Buckley's luck was still holding; it must be purely heaven sent

They finally made it to the hospital; Buckley was even improving, though he was getting stiff and sore

The doctor relayed to the crew, Buckley would live, and they were finished with their chore

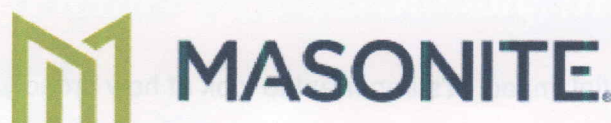
The doctor also added, or so I have been told, 'What saved Buckley wasn't their expert care, or safe driving, it was because Bailey's ammunition was old!'

## WHO WAS PLACEDORE BRAVO?

I stumbled across a place-name of "Placedore Gulch" in Grant County recently, with a creek draining into the South Fork of the John Day River just south of Murders Creek. Not recognizing it, I looked it up. It is about a dozen miles south of Dayville and drains a small area east of the river. It is said to bear the name of a Mexican, Placedore Bravo. Oregon Geographic Names says he was "well known in that part of the state," but he seems much less so currently. He evidently was born in California around 1858. He is enumerated in the 1860, 1870, and 1880 U. S. Census (The 1890 census was evidently destroyed).

Bravo came into Central Oregon around 1890 and was said to be very interested in horses and horse races. He is listed in 1898 at the U. S. General Land Office as being in Wheeler Co, OR. T11 S, R 23 E, NW ¼ section NW¼ Section 32, doc. # 2999, presumably owning a ranch. He is in the 1900 U. S. Census and again in 1909, Wheeler County, Section 30, #02127, (Another nearby ranch?) and in the 1910 U. S. Census; "Placedore Bravo, "age 53," Waterman, Wheeler County, Oregon. "Born CA," - "Single," native tongue "English," farm owner, reads "yes," writes "yes." Enumerated with Mary Fopiano, 52, "sister!" (Does this mean Mary Fopiano's maiden name was Bravo? If so, I probably went to school in Mitchell with her descendants, Patty and Barbra Collins!) Mary is "widow," and "farm owner" of Fopiano Ranch. Also enumerated with Charles Matherly, "hired man." (I have also worked at the Fopiano Ranch as "hired man" in 1960 stacking bales of hay.)

The 1920 U. S. Census has Bravo; "age 62," still in Mitchell, Wheeler County, Oregon." Reads? "yes," writes? "no." (?) "Father/mother born in Mexico, speaks Spanish. "Owns farm." Widower. (Next enumerated is "Hugh Johnson, (43) "drug dealer, owns store." Census Enumerator was the well-known Roy Monroe.)

1924; Placedore Bravo; U. S. General Land Office-Wheeler County, this time in Section 34-(more land?).

1930 U. S. Census- Not found. The fish were probably biting.

Bravo died in Grant County at the Old Mt. Vernon Hot Springs Hotel about 1940. (At the time, the old Hot Springs Hotel was a retirement home.) Twenty years later, I lived at the Old Hot Springs Hotel myself, and live now within one mile of it. ■

## IP 28: Ranchers, Hunters Watching IP 28 Closely

Because IP 28 centers on the intentional injury or killing of animals, it could affect a wide range of everyday activities. These may include hunting and fishing, slaughtering animals for food, livestock production, pest control, and certain breeding practices.

Supporters maintain that the intent is not to target responsible animal use, but to close what they see as loopholes in current law. They argue that existing exemptions allow unnecessary harm and that stronger protections are needed.

Critics, however, say the wording of the measure leaves too much open to interpretation. They argue that removing long-standing exemptions could create legal uncertainty for farmers, ranchers, hunters, and others who rely on animals for their livelihood or way of life.

The debate over IP 28 reflects a broader divide between urban and rural perspectives in Oregon. While some view the measure as a step forward for animal welfare, others see it as a threat to long-standing traditions and essential industries.

As the initiative moves forward, Oregonians will likely hear much more from both sides.

In the end, the decision—if it reaches the ballot—will rest with voters.

## Unforgettable Folks: The Legends Next Door

In this series, I've introduced you to several interesting folks I've been fortunate enough to know. These individuals, full of wisdom and personality, left an impression on me that hasn't faded with time. They weren't scholars in the traditional sense, but their intelligence was undeniable, shaped by experience, resilience, and an innate understanding of people and the world around them.

### Bob Humphreys

1958 dawned with Dan Cannon climbing the stairway of the rock, finally in high school. Starting her first year also that year was Virginia Humphreys, she as teacher and coach. Ginny had her three sons in school, so she was involved in everything school. Her husband, Bob Humphreys, a well-educated man, got involved in school functions too. Bob had a great sense of humor and a well-spoken man, so he more than fit in. The French language was taught in 1959, Virginia Humphreys instructor. It was quite comical to hear the romance language spoken with a red neck dialect. That was 67 years ago, I can only remember the French that Bob taught me, "Will you go to bed with me, darling?" is the English version. I don't know why I remember it because I never put it to use, never an opportunity to meet a mademoiselle. I do remember I sure didn't work in English! Bob went on to help us in other, more positive ways, poetry being one of them. He recited "The Strawberry Roan," and other classics from memory. We were impressed and really introduced to poetry through Bob. Bob learned to fly, compliments of the United States Naval Aviation Program, while going to OSU.

He wanted to impress one of his instructors, so he rented a plane, and when he landed on the Oregon Beach, the authorities were not as impressed as the instructor. They confiscated the plane and his license, and they returned by bus.

Bob could be influenced by a couple of things, like libations with a kick to it and Copenhagen. These things were probably induced from being in sheep camp through the early stage of his life. This could be a boring life if you didn't keep your mind occupied. Reading, writing, and exploring help fill the void. Bob found a crashed military plane with the pilot still strapped in it. Seems the plane was lost during a training flight and was never found until Bob did. The Humphreys sheep range also included Boeing Field north of Wolf Mountain, it was so named by a Boeing military plane crashing at the site.

I mentioned Bob being in the Navy, and while in flight

training, he and another pilot collided in mid-air. Bob survived, but the other pilot didn't. Bob never talked about it, so it still bothered him.

Bob never shied from speaking and was always ready to be an MC or officiant at a funeral. Bob is the one I blame for getting me involved in doing the same thing. When he became too ill, he volunteered me. Thanks, Bob! ■

but for his Family and Friends.

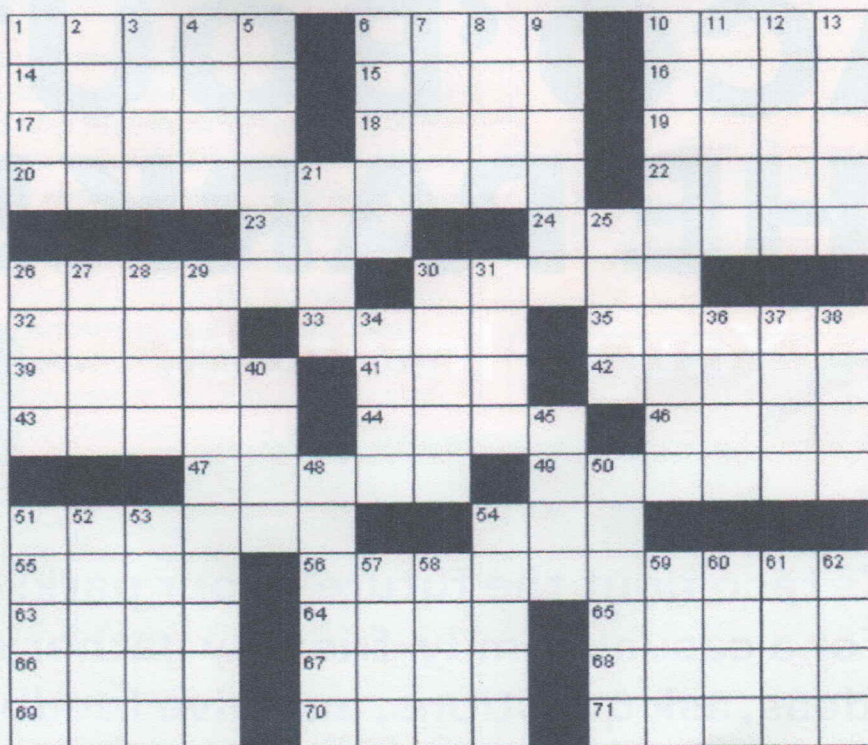
'Hump' is not resting on his laurels in Heaven,

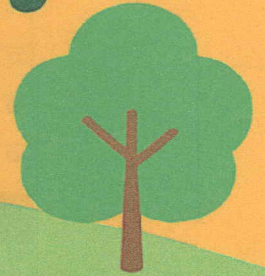
