2 The Fourteen Famous Women in the Bible

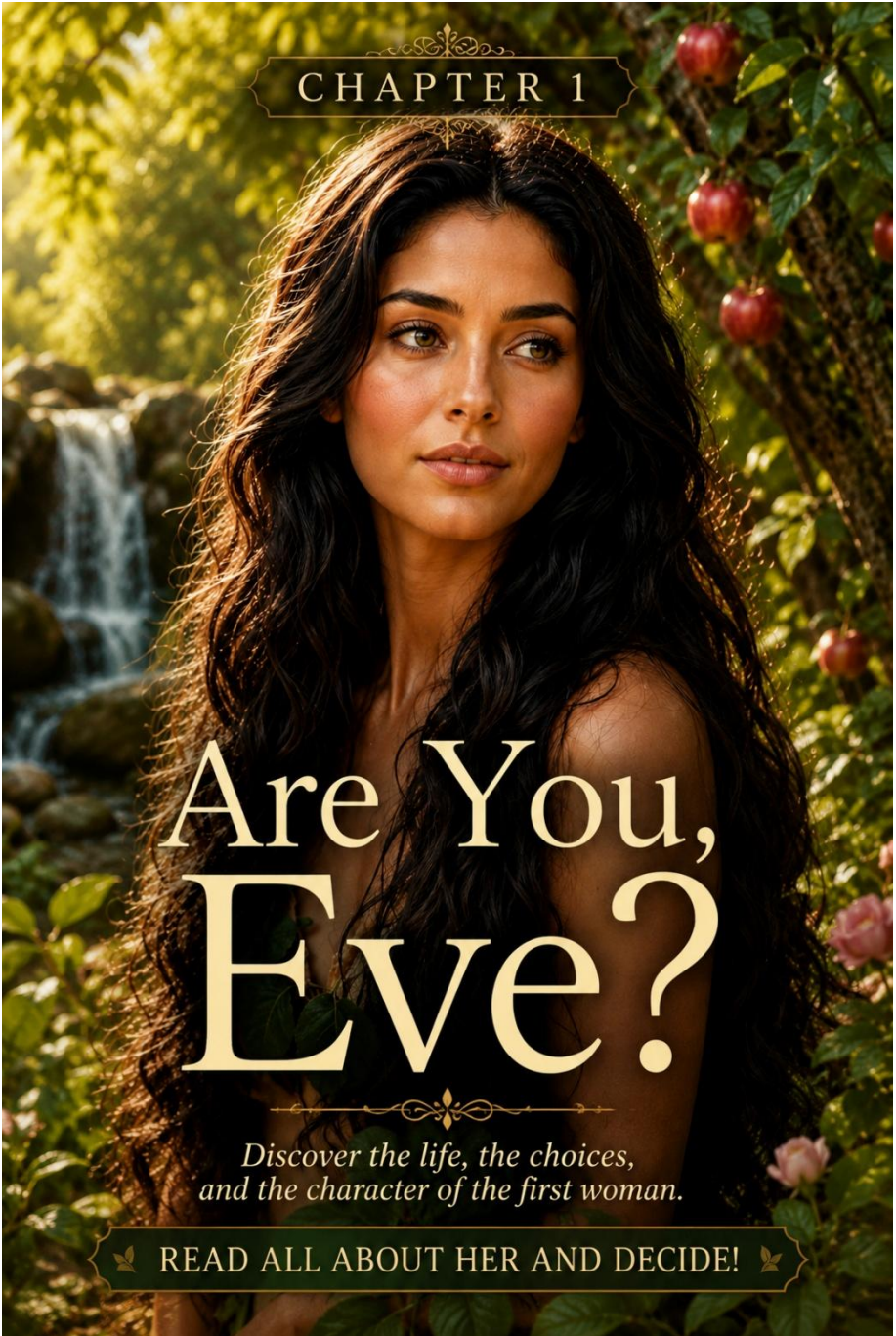
1. **Eve** – The first woman, created by God and the mother of all humanity (Genesis 2–4).

3 Are you Eve?

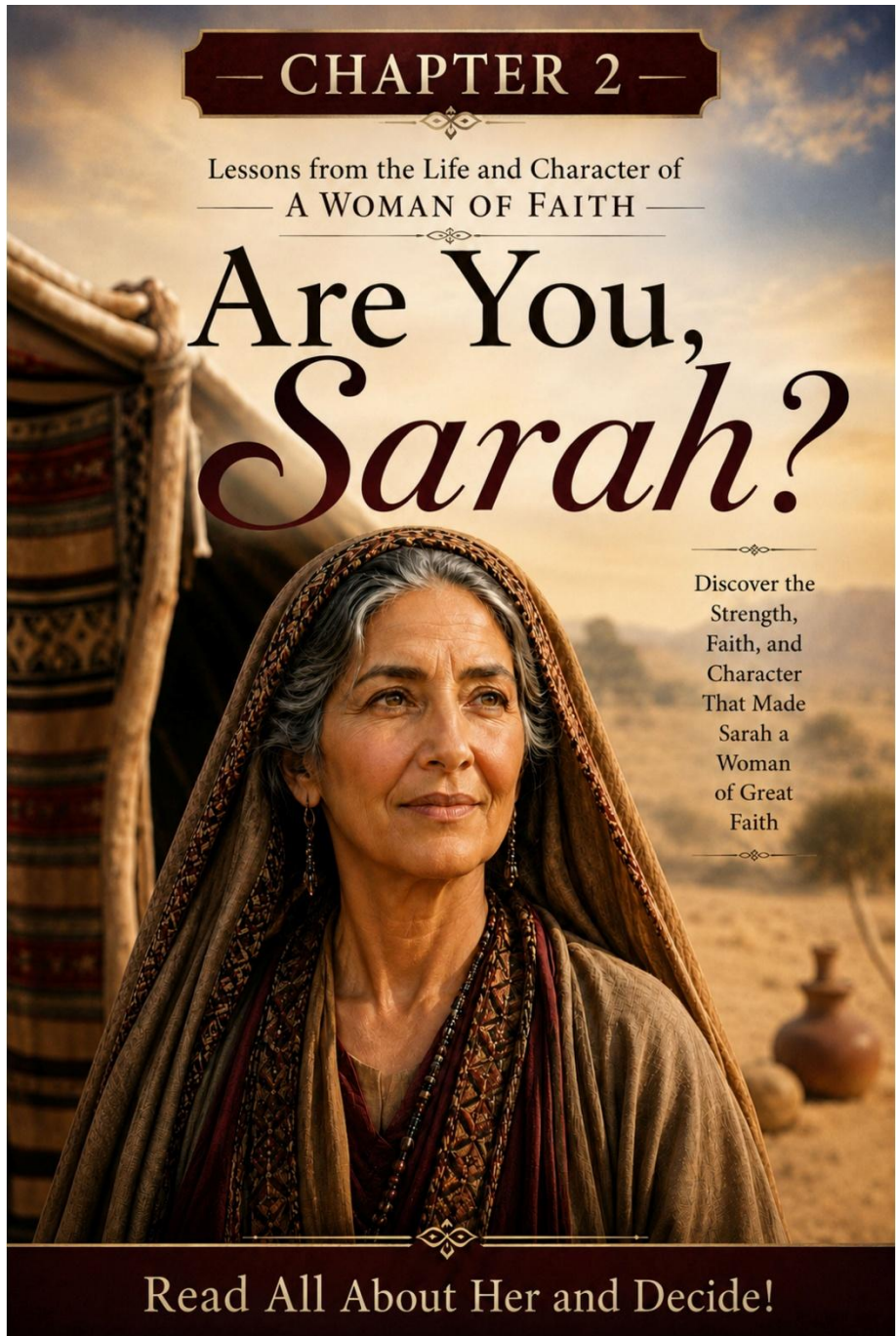
Eve's Character in a Modern Woman

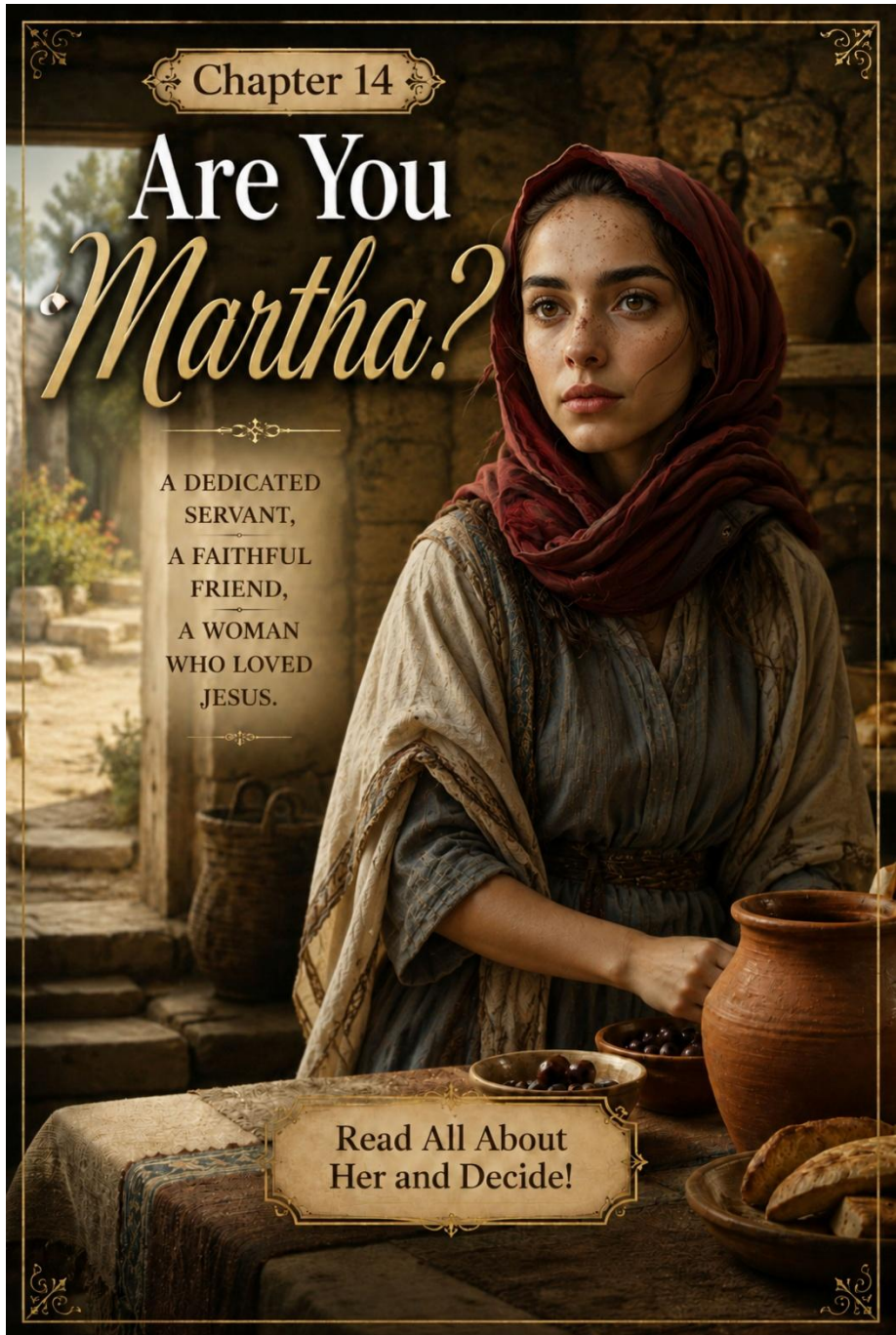
Mary Magdalene's Character in a Modern Woman
