Instead, rotate between three content categories:

#### **1. Encouragement**

Remind people of God's truth.

- Scripture
- Short prayers
- Message reminders
- Hope-filled thoughts

#### **2. Connection**

Show the people behind the ministry.

- Volunteers
- Worship practice
- Fellowship moments
- Smiles and real life

#### **3. Direction**

Help people take their next step.

- Service times
- What to expect
- Upcoming gatherings
- Simple invitations
- If your post fits one of these, it's doing its job.

## 5. How Often Churches Should Post (Realistic Expectations)

Here's the truth: *posting less content, consistently, is better than posting more content, inconsistently.*

### A realistic rhythm for most churches:

- Instagram / Facebook: 2–4 times per week
- Stories (optional): Sundays or events
- YouTube Shorts / Reels: 1 time per week if possible

### If life gets busy:

- Don't disappear
- Post something simple
- Grace-filled consistency builds trust

## 6. How to Sound Human Online (Tone Matters)

*People don't connect with announcements — they connect with voices.*
