INTRO MUSIC

(theatrical jazz fades in — intermission bell sound effect plays.)

HOST (Lauren):

SEGMENT 1 — Behind-the-Scenes of *Othello*

Lauren:

SEGMENT 2 — Interview with the Director

Lauren:

To learn more about how this production came to life, I spoke with **Ji Won Jeon**, who guided the

cast through Shakespeare's emotional battlefield.

Ji Won Jeon:

"Our goal was to honor Shakespeare's text while showing audiences why Othello still matters.

These students brought raw honesty to every rehearsal. Their commitment to truth-telling is what

made the show resonate."

Lauren:

You also shared how collaboration across design, performance, and movement departments

shaped the production's emotional arc.

Ji Won Jeon:

"Every design choice — from lighting to costumes — was crafted to reflect Iago's psychological

influence and Othello's conflict between rationality and jealousy. We wanted the audience to feel

the world closing in around Othello, just as he does."

SEGMENT 3 — Student Perspective

Lauren:

To get a performer's perspective, I chatted with **Rileigh Belle Wine**, a senior BFA acting major who played Desdemona.

Rileigh Belle Wine (clip):

"This production pushed us in the best way. We explored themes of trust, identity, and loyalty in rehearsal, and it made every scene feel alive. Shakespeare isn't easy, but when it clicks — it's electric."

Lauren:

I asked Rileigh what her favorite part of the process was.

Rileigh Belle Wine (clip):

"Definitely the platform work and character exploration. We spent days unpacking relationships and intentions. And honestly? This show has pushed me in many ways that others haven't."

(Sound cue: footstep sounds)

SEGMENT 4 — Community Connection

Lauren:

The MSU Department of Theatre has been creating impactful performances for decades, including many Shakespeare works and this production of *Othello* continued that legacy. The show invited audiences to reflect on the darker sides of human nature — manipulation, insecurity, and resilience — while celebrating student artistry at its highest level.

(Soft instrumental music builds)

With house packed nights and a powerful audience response, Othello brought Spartans together

for a shared experience filled with intensity, empathy, and the magic of live theatre.

So the next time you see a poster for an MSU Theatre production, grab a seat — because every

performance holds a bit of Spartan spirit and storytelling excellence.
