
Social Media in the Writing Classroom: Connecting Global Communities


Drew has a problem. His students don't see the value of their writing lessons, and they've become disengaged. If only he could find a way to make his writing lessons relevant to their daily lives....




Drew thought about his problem all day, and he was still thinking about it when he went to sleep. That night, Drew had a dream...
