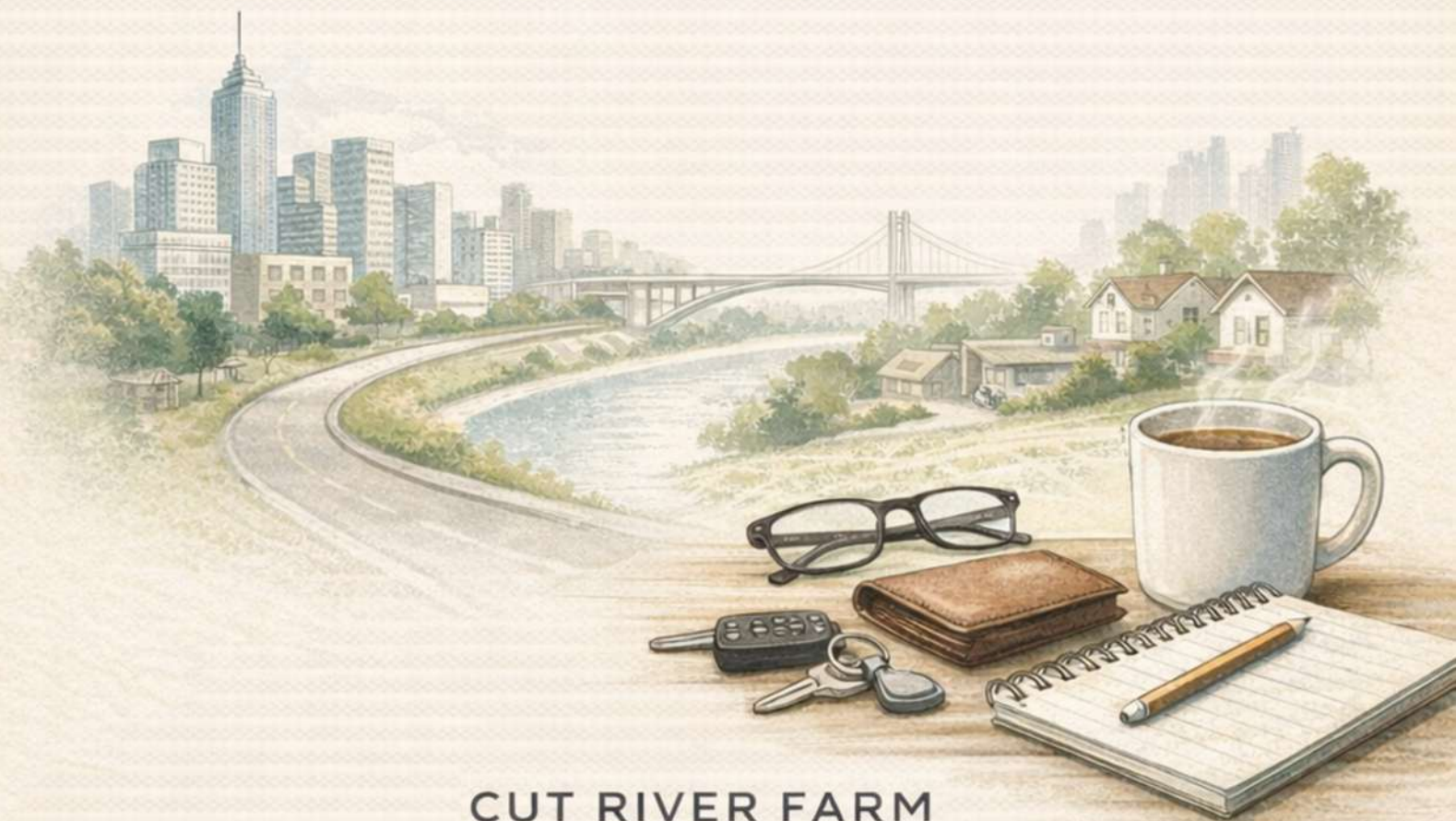

The Home Conversation

If your child is living at home after high school — whether for a month or a few years — your family needs to have an honest conversation. Not a vague "we'll figure it out" talk. A real conversation with expectations on both sides.

This isn't about rules. It's about respect — for the young adult you're supporting and for the household you're running. Young adults who thrive at home are the ones whose families treat it like a launching pad, not a landing spot.

Topics to Discuss Together

- ✓ How long is this arrangement? What does the timeline look like?
- ✓ What are the financial expectations — rent, groceries, bills?
- ✓ What does a weekly schedule look like for your child?
- ✓ What are you working toward, and how can you support it?
- ✓ How will you handle conflict and regular check-ins?
- ✓ What does independence look like at 6 months, 1 year, 2 years?

Living at home longer than previous generations did is historically normal — it's only the last 50 years or so that we expected 18-year-olds to immediately leave. The difference between a young adult building momentum at home and slowly drifting often comes down to clear expectations and honest conversations.

You invested 18 years in your child. Most parents genuinely want to help them launch well. But that launch requires intentionality and communication. Be their resource and their accountability partner, not just their safety net.

A schedule, a goal, and regular check-ins at home can create more momentum than most families realize.

They Need a Job — Any Job

This is not optional. If you are post-high school and not currently employed, that needs to change. Here's why:

- A job teaches you to show up, communicate, and perform under expectations — the soft skills most employers say young workers are missing.
- It gives you money, responsibility, and a chance to start building independence.
- It puts you in contact with people, industries, and paths you would never find sitting at home.
- It builds your resume — even a part-time retail or food service job shows character and reliability.

You don't have to love the job. You just have to do it well. Many young adults find their actual career direction while working a job they didn't plan on. Exposure leads to clarity.

How Young Adults Actually Find Their Direction

Career tests and counselors have their place, but here is how most people — including your parents — actually figured out what they wanted to do:

- They watched YouTube videos and went down rabbit holes about something that interested them.
- They worked a job, met people, and got exposed to a field they'd never considered.
- They talked to family members and friends who were doing real work — and asked questions.
- They attended a job fair or trade event and discovered careers they didn't know existed.

Notice what's not on that list: waiting. Clarity comes from exposure and action, not from thinking harder in your bedroom.

The Power of Job Fairs, Trade Shows & Conferences

One of the most underused tools for young adults is simply showing up somewhere the industry gathers. Encourage your child to attend two or three events a year — a local job fair, a trade show in a field that interests them, or even a free regional conference.

These events do something no website or career quiz can: they put real people, real jobs, and real possibilities in the same room. Sometimes a single conversation can completely change the direction of a young adult's future.

Real-World Paths Worth Exploring

Many young adults are surprised to discover how many strong career paths exist outside the traditional “pick a major and hope it works out” model.

Some opportunities include:

- skilled trades and apprenticeships,
- employer-paid education programs,
- career bootcamps,
- seasonal and residential work,
- entrepreneurship,
- specialized sales,
- government and military pathways,
- and certification-based careers.

The challenge is not that opportunities don't exist. It's that most families are never exposed to them.

Money: The Advantage of Living at Home

Most young adults are never taught the basics of money, saving, or long-term financial thinking. As a parent, this is one of the most valuable conversations you can have during the years after high school.

And for young adults living at home, this season creates a rare opportunity.

The Financial Window Most Young Adults Overlook

Living at home with low expenses can give young adults a financial head start that becomes much harder to create later in life.

This is one of the few seasons where they may be able to:

- save aggressively,
- avoid unnecessary debt,
- build good habits,
- and create real financial momentum early.

Encourage your child to think intentionally about their money while this window is open.

The goal is not perfection.

The goal is building habits that create long-term stability and independence over time.

Building Financial Habits Early

The exact financial strategy matters less than learning how to:

- save consistently,
- spend intentionally,
- avoid lifestyle inflation,
- and think long-term financially.

Many families are surprised how much progress a young adult can make financially in just one or two years of intentional living at home.

Simple habits practiced early often matter more than complicated financial systems later.

The Spending Conversation

Help your child become aware of three simple things:

- what comes in,
- what goes out,
- and what gets kept.

That awareness alone can change the trajectory of a young adult's financial future.

Spending is not the enemy.

Mindless spending is.

They will not live at home forever.

Help them leave with a foundation — not just a suitcase.

Encourage Them to Move Away for a Season

One of the most valuable things a young adult can do before locking into a long-term career path is spend time somewhere new with real responsibilities.

Not simply traveling.

Not drifting.

Real work. Real people. Real experiences.

For many young adults, a season away from home becomes the first time they fully learn how to:

- solve problems on their own,
- meet new people,
- adapt to unfamiliar situations,
- and build confidence outside their normal environment.

Experiences like these often create clarity in ways that sitting still never can.

Many parents are surprised how much growth can happen in just a few months when a young adult is placed in a new environment with responsibility and structure.

There are far more opportunities like this than most families realize, including:

- seasonal work programs like the Disney College Program
- national park jobs and other seasonal positions often found through websites like CoolWorks
- residential work programs that include housing and real-world experience
- service-based programs like AmeriCorps
- working abroad opportunities, cultural exchange programs, and TEFL pathways
- and many other experience-based opportunities for young adults

Our own daughter was shy and hesitant before she did a program like this. Afterward, she returned more confident, independent, and much more certain about her direction.

Growth rarely comes from waiting.

It usually comes from doing.
