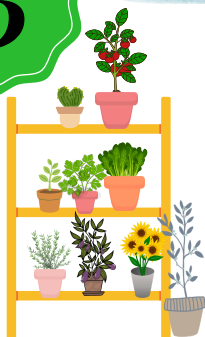

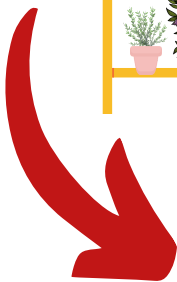

Living sustainably is a cornerstone of homesteading. Learn to minimize waste and make the most of what you already have:

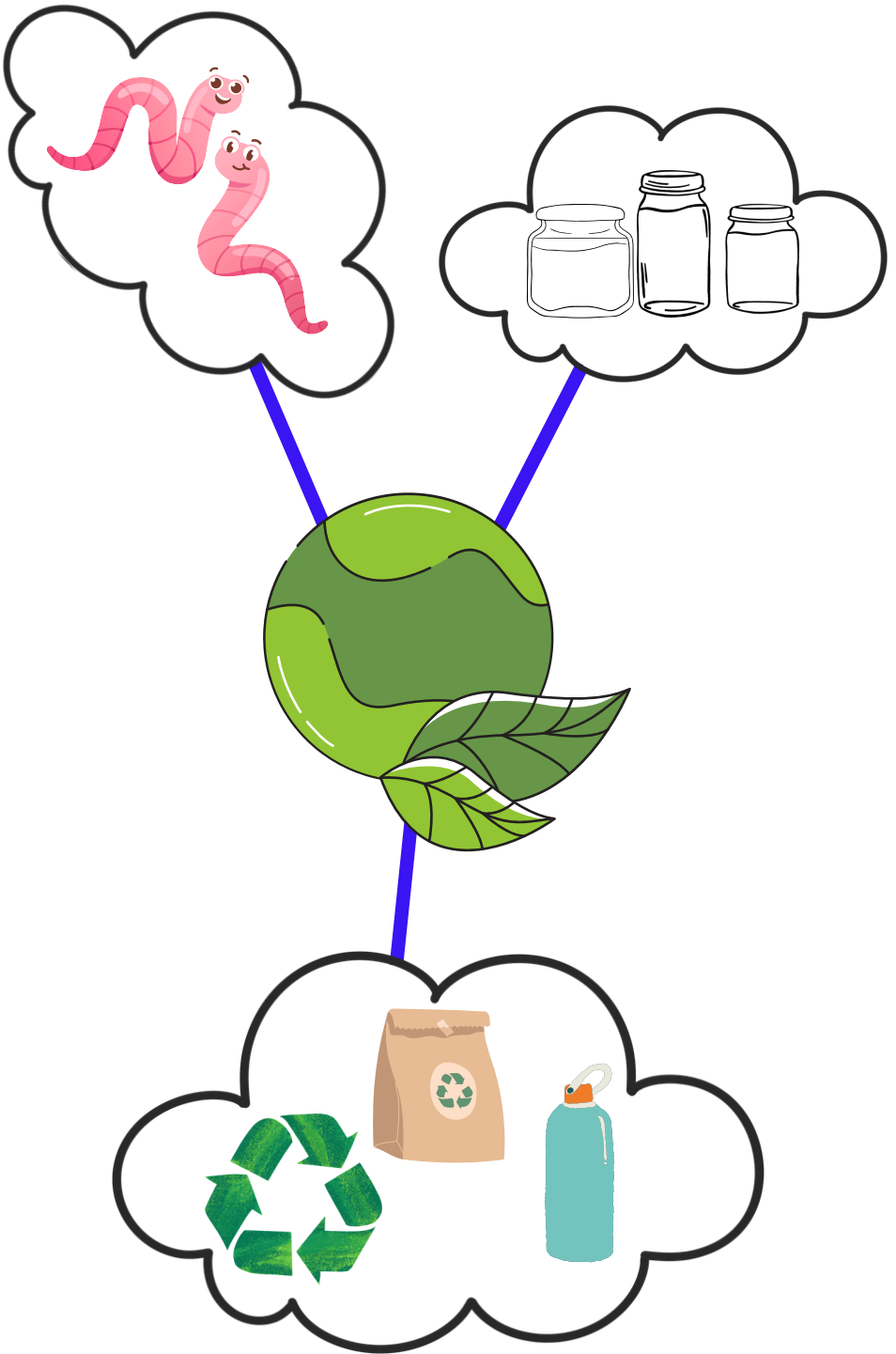
